

This week was the first week of unit one in <u>Treasures</u> about "Families". We began the week by reading a story called "Whose Baby am I?" by John Butler. It asks the reader to guess which animal family the baby animal on the page belongs to. We talked about how some baby animals look like their parents, and how some change as they grow into an adult. We also began talking about how all families are alike in some ways, yet all still unique. Our read-aloud story was an Aesop fable this week called "The Bundle of Sticks" which was about a farmer and his sons. The moral of this fable was that working together brings strength. As you may already know we have added a third word to our word wall this week, "we". The children get very excited when they start to notice words that they can read in our morning messages and in other print around the class. I hope that they are also showing excitement at home while reading the paper books to friends and family. It is so important for them to feel confident and excited about earning to read. Our vocabulary words were animal, together, protect, imitate, and resemble.

Lively Letters

This year we are using a new phonics program called "Lively Letters". This program uses imagery, mnemonics, and oral kinesthetic cues, which have been proven to help children develop a deeper understanding of letter sound relationships. Many of the letters are introduced in pairs, with one letter being the "noisy" partner and the other the "quiet" letter. Noisy letters require us to turn our voice on, and vibration can be felt in our neck. With quiet letters our voice is off and no vibration can be felt in our neck. The first partnership we introduced this week were letters "p" and "b". Ask your child to tell you the stories that go along with both of these letters.
